My apologies for not getting back to you sooner. I have moved from Dublin to Blackrock, Co. Louth and my Louth reference books are all over the place. I am still having problems locating any particular book. Not the neat and tidy 'library' I had in Dublin. I am surprised at the reply you had from the Library in Dundalk. They have access to the same books as me (and then some). I would have thought that they could easily answered your Polladuria question.

So,in case you have not already found out, Polladuria is a phonetic spelling of Poll an Diúraidh or Duryhole in the English version, a townland (all 11 acres of it) in the Civil Parish of Mosstown. You weren't far off!

The reference book where I found the information is entitled: *Liostai Logainmneacha: Lu/Louth*, no author, Ordnance Survey, 1991. It is a list of County Louth placenames in both English and Irish.

I am wondering if, in all of your Co. Louth research, you have ever come across the word POLLADURIA? That word is listed on 2 Roman Catholic baptism records I have obtained. I have not been able to find any other reference to POLLADURIA.

I know these folks lived in the townland of White River, a townland in the parish of Mosstown, within Co. Louth, at the time of the baptism of their first child, Thomas. I don't know if Polladuria is some other nearby location, or not. Perhaps it is an older name for a location now known by some other name.

Anyway, I would certainly appreciate any insight you may be able to share.
